A Quick Reference Guide:

What Parents Can Do If They Find Antisemitic Curriculum, Professional Development, or Student Activities in their School District

1. Identify the Problem

Look for:

- Stereotypes, demonization, or collective blame of Jews
- Erasure or distortion of Jewish history or identity
- One-sided political advocacy presented as fact
- Materials from activists instead of credible academic sources

2. Document Everything

- Save assignments, slides, readings, and links
- Take screenshots (with dates)
- Note class, teacher, and how the material was presented
- Record student impact

3. Check Policies

Review:

- District curriculum standards
- Anti-discrimination and bias policies
- Professional conduct rules for educators

4. Contact the School

- Start with the teacher escalating to the principal, superintendent, and school board, if necessary.
